## EYFS Phase: Nursery & Reception

This week, it has been lovely to see the kindness children are showing towards each other - I have caught numerous glimpses of children working beautifully as part of a team, helping a friend in class or showing someone the right choices to make. Qualities of patience and caring are so important and children seem to have it in abundance in both Nursery and Reception. Personal, social and emotional development is a crucial part of early years education and helps children develop healthy minds and self-regulation - we encourage children to talk about their feelings and use specially selected stories to explore thoughts and emotions through the characters' actions and behaviour. Nursery children have been reading 'Amazing Daisy', which encourages you to keep trying and believe in yourself, even when things are tricky - the children loved this story and the idea that we shouldn't give up. Children in Reception have been showing great originality, resilience and teamwork in building their own boats this week and testing materials for the boats to make sure they are waterproof. I loved seeing their super D&T skills in creating fruit boats too - delicious!

#### Learning in Nursery

The children in Wrens and Robins have had a great time in our wonderful small world area. They have been busy building train tracks for our selection of trains. What a fabulous job!

#### Learning in Reception

This week in maths the children have been looking at spatial awareness. We programmed the beebots to reach a particular object on the beebot mat. It has been amazing to hear the children using the new vocabulary they have learnt this week!













## Lower Phase: Years 1, 2 & 3

Children across the lower phase have been bringing in lots of fantastic and creative homework! It has been so wonderful to see the home learning that has been going on to enhance the children's knowledge and engagement; thank you parents for all your support with this. In Year 3 this week, the children have been cooking frittatas and have thought carefully about how this meal might contribute to a healthy diet. They have also used their knowledge of water transportation in plants to interpret their findings from their food colouring and celery experiment. In Year 2, the children have had great fun designing two afternoon tea menus for the Queen to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee. The children have peeled, grated and chopped ingredients to prepare vegetable fried rice and cheese sandwiches—delicious! The children in Year 1 have developed their sculpting skills this week and have moulded clay into an animal of their choice. Next week, they will use their knowledge of patterns to paint their animals by mixing paints together.

#### Learning in Year 4



#### Learning in Year 5


