A message from our Headteacher: Jill O'Connor

# Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back after what I hope was a wonderful half term holiday. We have had a fantastic week in school with children and staff thoroughly enjoying our love of books and reading as we celebrated World Book Day on Thursday. Thank you for all your practical and financial support which ensured that this day was a remarkable success and memorable for the children. Do look at the Twitter feeds highlighting our school's participation in this great annual event.

Congratulations to Mr Kirby on the birth of his second son Joshua James, who made his entrance on February 23rd. Our best wishes are extended to Chris and his family at this incredibly special time.

You will be aware that there are new Covid guidelines which have been introduced as we gradually resume school routines which are far more in keeping with pre Covid times. Details of what this new guidance means for children are detailed below.

# Testing positive for Covid 19

Those who test positive for Covid are no longer legally required to self-isolate, however if a person has any of the main symptoms of COVID-19 or a positive test result, the public health advice is to stay at home and avoid contact with other people. This also applies to children attending education and childcare settings. Staff and children who test positive will continue to be advised to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for at least 5 full days and then continue to follow the guidance until they have received 2 negative test results on consecutive days. We ask that parents continue to be vigilant for symptoms and access LFD testing should they wish to.

## Close Contacts

Fully vaccinated close contacts and those aged under 18 are no longer required to test daily for 7 days and routine contact tracing will end. Children who are contacts should attend their education settings as usual. Children who usually attend an education or childcare setting and who live with someone who has COVID-19 should continue to attend the setting as normal. Where children are household contacts and continue to attend school, we would recommend regular LFD testing where possible and for children to stay at home until receipt of a negative result if they develop symptoms. Pupils can still access test kits by ordering online or through their local pharmacy.

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### Ukraine

I am certain that you will agree that the situation in Ukraine is horrendous. Whilst we are geographically far away from the events, children in our school and community may have families or roots in the region and could be directly affected. The news and social media feeds are filled with the latest information, and some of it is very upsetting and worrying; and may not even be verified. Children listening and viewing distressing images can become frightened and fearful.
